Welcome to all – especially visitors!!! **It is no accident that you are here today!** You are an answer to our prayer. We have been praying for you, and believe that God has brought you here because God wants to touch your life.

If you need some help to make your worship with us more accessible, please see an usher for assistance. A transport chair and large print bulletins are available if you have need for them.

Lent begins with a solemn call to fasting and repentance as we begin our journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. As we hear in today's readings, now is the acceptable time to return to the Lord. During Lent the people of God will reflect on the meaning of their baptism into Christ's death and resurrection. The sign of ashes suggests our human mortality and frailty. What seems like an ending is really an invitation to make each day a new beginning, in which we are washed in God's mercy and forgiveness. With the cross on our brow, we long for the spiritual renewal that flows from the springtime Easter feast to come.

Lutherans believe that the bread and wine of Holy Communion are signs given by God that Christ is fully present among us. We invite you to participate in receiving this miraculous presence. If you are unable to receive either the bread or the wine, be assured that even in the words, Christ is present to you. You are welcome to come to the Table to be fed and nurtured with us.

WORD

FIRST READING: Joel 2:1–2, 12–17

Because of the coming Day of the Lord, the prophet Joel calls the people to a community lament. The repentant community reminds God of his gracious character and asks God to spare the people, lest the nations doubt God's power to save.

sound the alarm on my holy mountain!
**Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble,

nor will be again after them
in ages to come.**

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you,
and on a day of salvation I have helped you."


See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see — we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where

moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

SERMON

HYMN OF THE DAY *Be Thou My Vision* (ELW 793)

INVITATION TO LENT

P Friends in Christ, today with the whole church we enter the time of remembering Jesus' passover from death to life, and our life in Christ is renewed.

We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance and for God's mercy. We are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation. But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to the discipline of Lent—self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love—strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament. Let us continue our journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

CONFESSION OF SIN

P Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

P Most holy and merciful God,

C we confess to you and to one another,
and before the whole company of heaven,
that we have sinned by our fault,
by our own fault,
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

P We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P We have shut our ears to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have frustrated your Holy Spirit.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Our past unfaithfulness, the pride, envy, hypocrisy, and apathy that have infected our lives, we confess to you.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, we confess to you.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us, we confess to you.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, we confess to you.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Our poor stewardship shown through waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.

C Have mercy on us, O God.

P Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.

C Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

IMPOSITION OF ASHES

People may come forward and kneel or stand to receive the ashes.

The presiding minister marks the forehead of each person with a cross of ashes, saying:

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.

After those who desire ashes have received them, all remain seated, and the minister continues.

- P** Accomplish in us, O God, the work of your salvation,
C **that we may show forth your glory in the world.**
P By the cross and passion of your Son, our Savior,
C **bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.**
P Almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen us in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep us in eternal life.
C **Amen.**

- A** Lifting our voices and turning toward God, let us pray for the church, the earth, and all who are in need.





Have Mercy on Us

Across the world, church doors stand open in the middle of the week and we come. There is silence, strange and awkward. For a few short moments the frenetic tasks and worries of this world flutter to the ground before God, the God who sees in secret.

This day God grieves over us as a parent over a willful child. In word, in silence, in poignant sign and symbol we know God's deepest desire for us to return to that for which we were created. Yet the limits of our humanity are sealed in the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." We have fallen short, disappointed. Adam and Eve, first to hear these words in the Garden of Eden, lead the procession beneath the sign of the cross.

It is not our God alone who longs for our coming of age. This day we join all creation, with groans too deep for words, in our desire for the dominion of God to be a tangible reality, right now, both in our most secret places and in this world of great good and great evil.

"Have mercy on me, O God" (Ps. 51:1). The psalmist echoes our own secret prayer prompted by our own gray and anxious days that are lived out in this gray and anxious time. Throughout centuries of devotion, this prayer has been the great equalizer of the sure-footed and the frightened, the powerful and the powerless. Open and vulnerable, we join the psalmist's plea for re-formation, that God would return us to that for which we were born.

Lent is bittersweet as a parent's love for a child. Through ash and flame, word and silence, disappointment and longing, God grieves over us and then offers the supreme sacrifice. How can we not live a larger life, give our lives away for the love of God's waiting world?
